*Secretary's Report***December**

President Derald Morgan opened the meeting. Compatriot Brian Alexander led the Pledge of Allegiance. All joined in the pledge to the SAR. Father McAbee gave the invocation.

President Morgan recognized the guests in attendance. They were Mrs. Linda Maples, Mrs. Abby Alexander, Ms. Kimberly Alexander, Compatriots Richard Smallwood and Father Les McAbee, Mr. Mrs. and Russ Jenness, Mrs. Nancy Rohr, Mrs. Susan Crabtree, Mr. John Blair, and Mrs. Gay Ritch. President Morgan presented a supplemental certificate to Compatriot Tod Jenness on his patriot ancestor Jacob Motes of the Pennsylvania militia. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Russ Jenness, participated in the presentation. Compatriot Ernie Ritch held the colonial period quiz. Twenty-five dollars was collected for the youth programs.

Vice-President Brian Alexander introduced our speaker, Mrs. Nancy Rohr. Mrs. Rohr spoke on the events in Huntsville during the Civil War. Her material source was the diary of Mrs. Mary Jane Chadick, who entered the events as they happened each day. Mrs. Chadick's husband was a colonel in the Alabama militia. Mrs. Rohr stated that during the war, Huntsville had 4,000 residents – 2,000 white and 2,000 black. She said that during the period of the war approximately 400,000 troops passed through Huntsville, and most were thieves and plunderers.

Compatriot Jim Alexander stated that there were 19 candidates to enter the essay contest. Candidates were from Huntsville High School, Randolph School and Bob Jones High School. The essays were given to Compatriot Dr. David Billings to have them scored by UAH professors. Compatriot Alexander stated that the winner would be recognized at the February meeting.

The chapter voted to put a chapter ad in the ALSSAR 2007 state convention ad booklet. Compatriot Harold Wright said the dues to the Veteran's Coalition are now due. The chapter voted to pay the \$50.00 dues. Compatriot Jim Alexander made a motion that the chapter become a member of the national SAR's 'Friends of the Library.' The vote was unanimous to pay the \$25.00 to become a member. Treasurer Ernie Ritch will disperse the checks for the Veteran's Coalition dues and 'Friends of the Library' membership. Compatriot Ernie Ritch led the recessional, and Compatriot Les McAbee gave the benediction. President Morgan adjourned the meeting.

January

President Derald Morgan opened the meeting. All attendees joined in the Pledge of Allegiance. Compatriot Bill Pittman led the pledge to the SAR. Chaplain Hoyt Smith gave the invocation.

Vice-President Brian Alexander introduced our speaker; Ms. Brenda Webb, Director of the Huntsville City Cemeteries. Ms. Webb, a native of Jackson Co., Alabama, spoke on nine historical cemeteries in and around Huntsville. She explained the duties of her staff, and told of the rehabilitation effort ongoing at the Huntsville cemeteries. She explained the Historical Site Tree Program. This is a program whereby a person or organization can give \$85 and have a seedling tree, taken from an American historical tree, transplanted in a local Huntsville cemetery. She stated that she is a member of the Alabama Historical Cemetery Study Commission. At the end of her talk she entertained questions from the audience.

Chapter officers and committee Chairmen gave their reports. Compatriot Jim Alexander stated that the essay winners of the essay contest would be recognized at the February meeting. Compatriot John Rison Jones stated he and his cousin have made arrangements for a marker for the grave of one of his patriot ancestors, Josiah Brandon, buried near Lynchburg, Tennessee.

President Morgan reminded everyone about the state convention in Montgomery the 16th-17th of next month. He also told about the Boy Scout cultural event at Alabama A&M on the 17th of February. He will operate a Sons of the American Revolution information booth during the event. He also assigned a nominating committee for chapter officers for the coming year. The committee consists of Compatriots Jim Maples, Jim Alexander and Ernie Ritch. Jim Maples was designated the committee chairman. Compatriot Jim Maples led the recessional, and Compatriot Hoyt Smith gave the benediction. President Morgan adjourned the meeting.

Sons of the American Revolution Visit Elementary School

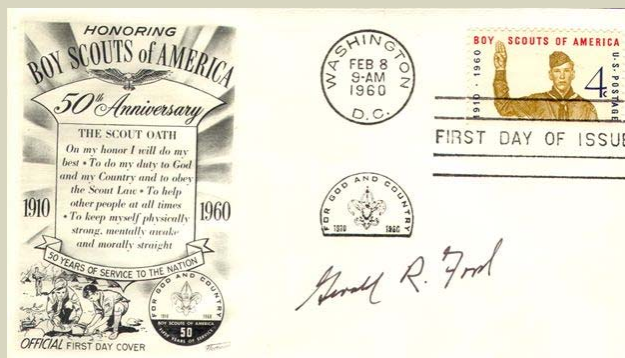
